Brief description of the course and its content including details of any sub-divisions	The course provides the students with basic knowledge and understanding of the archaeology of the Iron Age in Scandinavia and the rest of Europe. Key themes such as relations with the Roman Empire, migration and the building of autonomous nations within and beyond Scandinavia are introduced. Various perspectives of interpretation are discussed. The sub-course in field studies involves the students participating in an archaeological excavation and thereafter working with the material and writing of reports. The course is completed with the composition of a written assignment, which discusses a topic from the pre-historic era.
		 The course consists of the following sub-courses: 1. The Iron Age in Scandinavia and the Rest of Europe, 10 credits, 2. Approaches and Methods within Iron Age Research, 5 credits, 3. Field Studies, 7.5 credits, 4. Written Assignment, 7.5 credits.
