| 1.        | Brief description of the course and its content including details of any sub-divisions | <p><i>The course provides the students with basic knowledge of society, culture and living conditions in Scandinavia from the period of the Viking Age until the Industrial Revolution. The study of material culture, images and texts are used as a point of departure.</i></p> <p><i>The course examines various interpretive approaches to landscapes, villages, towns, buildings, architecture and images. It also includes the study of human beings' conceptual frameworks and living conditions. Students are provided with an introduction to research into cultural landscapes, urban archaeology, the archaeology of buildings, the analysis of finds within historical archaeology and numismatics. The role of historical archaeology in contemporary society is also discussed.</i></p> <p><i>The course consists of the following sub-courses:</i></p> <ol style="list-style-type: none"> <li><i>1. Landscapes and Development, 10 credits,</i></li> <li><i>2. Buildings and Art, 10 credits,</i></li> <li><i>3. People and Artefacts, 10 credits.</i></li> </ol> |
