4. Course Content		
1.	Brief description of the course and its content including details of any sub-divisions	<p><i>The course includes the in-depth study of the approaches, methods of and skills required by the discipline of Historical Archaeology. This is achieved through the students following a project through all its stages from planning in archives and libraries to field work. The course also includes an introduction to current areas of research into Historical Archaeology in Europe and the rest of the world. Students are expected to complete a written assignment where they are given the opportunity to develop their knowledge of theories and methods by selecting an area of specialisation relevant to current research into historical archaeology.</i></p> <p><i>The course consists of the following sub-courses:</i></p> <ol style="list-style-type: none"> <i>1. Project in Historical Archaeology, 10 credits,</i> <i>2. Europe and the Rest of the World, 10 credits,</i> <i>3. Essay Course, 10 credits.</i>

All elements of the course, other than lectures, are compulsory.</i>
