Brief description of the course and its content including details of any sub-divisions	<i>This is a specialist reading course in which the theme and literature are chosen in consultation with the supervisor. The outcome is a degree essay, which is the result of an autonomous analysis and interpretation of a problem area in archaeology. The subject is chosen in consultation with the supervisor.</i>

1.	Teaching methods employed including details of any compulsory components	<i>Teaching consists of obligatory seminars and individual supervision.</i>
2.	Examination details	<i>Sub-course 1 is examined orally or by the submission of a written assignment. The degree essay is defended at a seminar. In order to pass the course, the student is also required to give a formal critique of the degree essay of another student.</i>
