1.	Brief description of the course and its content including details of any sub-divisions	<p><i>The specialist reading course deals with research traditions in historical archaeology. It also includes an in-depth study with examples taken from historical archaeology. The degree essay constitutes an autonomous analysis and interpretation of an issue within historical archaeology. The subject matter is chosen in consultation with the supervisor</i></p> <p><i>The course consists of the following two sub-courses:</i></p> <ol style="list-style-type: none"> <i>1. Research Traditions, 15 credits</i> <i>2. Degree Essay, 15 credits</i>
